As a first-generation college student and former foster youth, Rich Pauloo didn't always see graduate study as a part of his future. But with support along his educational path, Pauloo is on track to earn a Ph.D. in hydrogeology and help sustain California's groundwater supply.


Climate change-induced drought, excessive consumption and pollution threaten the longterm health of California's and the world's water reserves. Pauloo has developed lowcost, open-source wireless sensor networks for groundwater monitoring. He's also currently building an online tool for water managers in California to simulate groundwater level decline.

Graduate school, says Pauloo, reaffirmed his belief that he can do anything he sets his mind to. For former foster youth, graduate school can be an uncertain venture. UC Davis' Guardian Professions Program helps remove some of that uncertainty for students like Pauloo.
