

Ours is a relatively young school that nonetheless has deep and far-reaching roots in the broader educational community. This distinctive identity represents a potent combination of nimbleness, rigor and relevance.

Amplified by the power of one of the nation's top-ranked public research universities, our impact is also invigorated by our proximity to the capital of the world's fifth-largest economy, with the capacity to shape educational practice and policy annually impacting nearly 9 million students.

In just over 15 years, the UC Davis School of Education has established itself among the nation's top education schools, renowned across the state and country for leadership in advancing educational opportunity and attainment. Since the school's founding in 2002, we have steadily grown our teaching credential, master's and doctoral programs, while doubling our faculty ranks and achieving significant growth in external grants and financial support from alumni and university friends.

At the same time, the School of Education is built on a strong foundation of educational leadership, dating back to the university's first teacher preparation programs in 1918. Over the course of the past century, UC Davis has become a trusted partner to educational communities and a key source of policy guidance to the state agencies governing California across the K-16 spectrum, as well as one of the state's foremost educators of teachers and education leaders.

Every day, the School of Education is actively working to expand and equalize educational opportunities. From research and policy guidance that help teachers to successfully navigate today's complex classrooms, to designing cutting-edge digital learning tools for a new generation, we are preparing tomorrow's change-makers.

Academic Programs with a Distinctive Edge

- Ph.D. program—doctor of philosophy degree in education





The Center for Shakespeare in Diverse Classrooms, a unique partnership with London's Globe Education theater program, is just one example of how we prepare educators with innovative teaching techniques designed to reach all types of learners—a School of Education hallmark.



Scholarship Support: A Vital Impact

Scholarships and fellowships are critical to attracting, supporting and inspiring more of the accomplished, dedicated students who are committed to making a difference as tomorrow's teachers and education leaders. Gifts to support scholarships open doors to a world-class education for talented students regardless of financial means, removing barriers that might otherwise deter promising candidates from pursuing careers in education.

Teaching credential candidates face significant demands on their time and on their financial resources. Candidates typically spend their days gaining experience in K-12 classrooms and their evenings in School of Education classes—leaving very little time to pursue paid employment to help offset their educational expenses. Even after graduation, modest beginning teacher salaries add to their financial pressure.

In its first 15 years, the school has established more than 30 scholarships, providing partial support for some students—but so many more students remain in need.

Our vision is that no deserving student who dreams of teaching will be turned away from our school for lack of financial resources.

The Philanthropic Opportunity: Empowering next-generation education leaders

- Fund scholarships that expand access to educational excellence for teaching credential and master's students who seek to work in elementary, middle and high schools
- Support CANDEL students pursuing doctorates in education leadership
- Create graduate fellowships that attract and support exceptional scholars pursuing their Ph.D.s

A Critical Need: Easing financial barriers to a first-class education

- Current tuition costs for one year in the teaching credential program: *More than \$16,000*
- Full cost of tuition and expenses: *More than \$30,000*
- Average beginning salary for California public K-12 educators: Less than \$50,000 annually

IGNITING CHANGE THROUGH LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

As an active resource to K-12 and higher education leaders statewide, the School of Education advises decision-makers across the education system about evidence-based leadership for change.

The school provides research, leadership development, publications and support to peer networks of education leaders, practitioners and policymakers across California. As just two prominent examples:

- The **Wheelhouse** center develops leadership and research acumen for presidents and chancellors in the California Community College system, which educates more than 2 million students annually. Since 2016, Wheelhouse has served more than 60 community college CEOs—from the southern border and the Central Valley to the Bay Area and the rural north—to expand their leadership capacity and peer networks.
- The **Center for Applied Policy in Education (CAP-Ed)** provides cohort-based networks to school district superintendents, principals and education leaders in the K-12 education system, dedicated to eliminating educational inequities for more than 6.2 million students across the state. Since 2008, CAP-Ed has served more than 170 superintendents in 120 California school districts and, since 2016, has served 120 principals and 140 teacher leaders in building instructional capacity in their districts and schools.

- Expand the reach of leadership networks to impact more schools and the students they serve

School of Education faculty are preeminent experts in their fields, tackling critical challenges with wide-ranging impacts for all learners, and preparing graduate students whose research and practice will advance the field and inspire thousands of students in turn.

Our researchers partner with decisionmakers and educators to improve outcomes at all levels of our state's educational system—leading the way in addressing timely, relevant issues in education, and informing policy that can shape a brighter future for all students.

A_{\cdot} School Organization and Education Policy

Among California's foremost go-to resources for education policy guidance focused on increasing student success, School of Education research centers are a principal source of data and analysis to California education's K-16 system.

For example, the school's **California Education Lab** advises the California Department of Education and all three segments of public higher education (community colleges, the CSU system and the UC system) on key issues related to educational success and equity. These efforts have a vital impact in shaping policy and practice—from evaluating the new K-12 academic standards and their impact on students from varied backgrounds; to incorporating state K-12 assessments in admissions and placement; to partnering with the state to assess reforms within the California Community College system, increase graduation rates and ensure more equitable student outcomes.

B. Language, Literacy and Culture

Through scholarship and policy guidance focused on building a more equitable educational culture, the School of Education is forging partnerships and collaborations aimed at making a powerful difference in students' lives and in our broader communities.

This impact is exemplified by the **Transformative Justice in Education Center (TJE)**, a community-university collaboration committed to disrupting race-based inequities in education. With support from generous donors, TJE prepares classroom teachers and practitioners to foster a restorative culture in their teaching and learning communities. The center is also emerging as a national and international leader in translating its research into practice within school districts and communities—convening scholars across the U.S. and as far away as New Zealand and South Africa to confront educational inequities.

Pillars of Research Excellence continued

C_{\cdot} Learning and Mind Sciences

The School of Education is home to a number of leading experts engaged in translational research related to the academic development of students with special learning needs, including defining the characteristics and challenges of autism spectrum disorder (ASD) and developing curricula for special populations.

Several of our faculty, for example, are affiliated with the **UC Davis MIND Institute**, a world-renowned research center focused on improving the quality of life for individuals with neurodevelopmental disabilities and their families. To cite just a few of their critical contributions, our faculty are designing innovative digital learning environments for special-needs populations, creating instructional support tools that enhance comprehension for students with reading disabilities, and pioneering new strategies for promoting active classroom engagement in students with ASD.

D_{\cdot} Science, Agriculture and Math Education

Leveraging the world-class expertise and resources of UC Davis—ranked among the top five universities internationally in the areas of plant and animal science, the environment, and agricultural sciences—the School of Education is uniquely positioned to provide intellectual leadership, applied research, and programs that increase teacher capacity to support students' development of STEM skills.

One of many examples of the school's leadership is the **Center for Community and Citizen Science (CCCS)**, which investigates and actively fosters youth-focused models for engaging citizens, communities and researchers to work together to advance knowledge, solve problems and learn from each other. From school garden partnerships with the USDA, UC Davis Student Farm and local districts to collaborations with natural history museums in Los Angeles and the U.K., the center is expanding the reach of STEM experiences for diverse learners.
